Potter Else Berg

Based on Jeremiah 18:1-11

Else Berg was born in Ratibor in Silesia on February 19, 1877, the youngest daughter of a Jewish cigar manufacturer. Because she wanted to become a painter, she started an art education in Paris in 1895. Among other things, she was taught at the studio of J.C. Laurens, where the French artist Henri Le Fauconnier was one of her fellow students.

During the Second World War, her Jewish origins made it difficult to exhibit work. Initially, they felt safe in Amsterdam, but they refused to wear the "Yellow Badge" when it became mandatory and went into hiding in Baambrugge. On November 12, 1942, Else Berg and her husband, Mommie Schwarz, were arrested and deported via Westerbork to Auschwitz on November 16, where they were murdered three days later.
