Feeding the Multitudes

This story is told in all four gospels, giving it significance and describing a situation to which we can all relate. It is late, people are hungry and there is seemingly not enough food. The disciples want to send the crowd away to buy food in the villages, but Jesus says something that seems impossible. He tells them to feed the people themselves. In this metaphorical miracle, Jesus takes the five loaves and two fish, he blesses them—giving thanks to God, breaks the bread, and then gives them to the disciples to feed the people. After all are fed, there are twelve baskets of broken pieces left...It is heartbreaking to think of the amount of hunger in the world when we are told that there is enough. We see so much waste. Perhaps Jesus wanted us to recognize the miracle of sharing and our own abilities to help others, focusing on abundance and not scarcity...
